
Last day to turn in orders for wreaths. Funds will go toward a kitchen remodel.


Teacher Martha's Class

Bible has been interesting this week as they have continued to draw the days of creation. They are learning how the days are interconnected, meaning that before there were sun, moon and stars there needed to be light and dark and firmament. Before there were birds, fish, and animals there needed to be vegetation. God was a God of order.

In grammar we have been learning in 5th and 6th grade about concrete and abstract nouns. We also learned about writing a fictional narrative. They are in the rough draft stage right now. The 7th grade students have been learning about subject and predicate nouns and identifying the main idea of the I Am Malala book that they are reading. 4th grade is working on finding their comparative and superlative adjectives. In Social Studies the students are almost finished with the era between the Civil War and the beginning of the 1900's. They are exploring inventions and innovations, politics, social injustices, growth and movement, and immigration.
